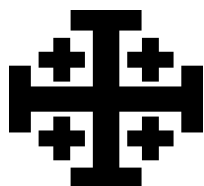

St. Ann focus on *EVANGELIZATION*

In response to hearing about my new job title as Director of Evangelization at St. Ann, people usually respond with questions like, “What does that mean?” or “What will you do, Kurt?”

These questions are a natural response; because, for Catholics, the word “evangelization” carries ambiguity and even negativity. We aren’t exactly sure what it means. Many of us associate evangelization with a bad experience of someone pressing us about it and when we were saved. As a result, Catholics often view evangelization as “a Protestant thing”.

Evangelization can also feel in-

timidating; something we’d prefer to leave to the experts. In reality, we “evangelize” all the time, eager to tell others about what inspires, excites and impassions us. The word evangelization essentially means “sharing the Gospel” or “Good News” of Jesus Christ.

Think about it. We’re always ready to share our good news with others – whether it’s an exciting family happening, an amazing event in our day, or our favorite restaurant, movie or sports team. Sharing the good news of our faith begins when we personally experience God’s love and mercy such that we can’t help but

share it with others. I once heard beautiful explanation of evangelization as simply “one beggar telling another beggar where he found bread.”

In the Bible, we receive not only the *invitation* to share the Good News of our faith in Jesus – we receive the absolute *call* and *responsibility* – both as individuals and as a church. St. Paul writes, “Woe to me if I do not evangelize!” (1 Corinthians 9:16) Saint Pope John Paul II echoed the cry of St. Paul when he wrote, “No believer in Christ can avoid this supreme duty: to proclaim Christ to all peoples.”

Musings from the Pastor:

I am writing this article as we are about to begin our annual Carnival. I am also recovering from a pretty major injury I sustained at the very beginning of my vacation in Breckenridge, Colorado. My accidental fall landed me in the hospital in Frisco, Colorado with five fractured ribs and a punctured lung. So instead of hiking and fly fishing for 5 days, I spent 12 days in St. Anthony Summit Medical Center in Frisco, Colorado. Because of multiple

fractures I had to have surgery and the surgeon placed titanium plates on four of the five broken ribs.

Sometimes our Lord has us experience something that takes us “away from the crowd” so He can enter more deeply into the recesses of our hearts. I have been overwhelmed with the outpouring of prayers and well wishes from texts, emails and cards. Thank you for the love and compassion you all have shown me. I have been told that ribs heal pretty slowly so I will be going in ‘slow

motion’ for a while. Please be patient with me as I heal from this injury.

I had planned on attending the Diaconate Ordinations of Emmett Hall and Paul Bechter at St. Peter’s in Rome but have decided not to since I will still not be fully healed. Most likely there will be another opportunity for me to visit Paul and Emmett in Rome in their diaconate year at North American College. We certainly are all looking forward to

Emmett’s and Paul’s Ordination to the Priesthood at the Cathedral Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe here in the Dallas Diocese next summer.

This year our parish has 8 seminarians...Deacon Paul Bechter, who just officially joined our parish this past summer, Deacon Emmett Hall – Paul and Emmett are both at the North American College in Rome; Michael Baynham and Ryan Hiaeshutter at the Theological College in Washington DC; Desmond Ndikum at Notre Dame Seminary in New Orleans; Nicholas Shelton and Sam Ford at Holy Trinity Seminary and Andres Felipe Angulo who is studying in Mexico at the Apostles of the Immaculate Heart of the Divine Mercy. We have a total of 64 seminarians studying for the Diocese of Dallas. We will continue to pray fervently for vocations to the priesthood and religious life.

Our Diocese is celebrating its 125th Anniversary this year and we have just completed our ‘in-pew’ filling out of pledge cards for the

Our Faith...Our Future Diocesan and Parish Campaign. I am happy to report that we exceeded our parish goal of \$4,560,000 and the Diocese is fast approaching its goal of \$125,000,000 with total pledges at around \$115,000,000. They are predicting that when all is said and done, that goal of \$125,000,000 will also be reached and exceeded. The first priority for the monies that we will receive for our parish will be to finish out the renovation of St. Ann Center. I thank God for the positive and most generous response we received from so many of you. May God reward you for your support.


Finally, we look forward to 2016 when St. Ann will be celebrating its 30th anniversary...and also, I will be celebrating my 40th anniversary of priestly ministry. It will be a year of giving thanks to Almighty God for His love and His generosity to us.

I end this letter with a quote from our Pope Francis from his letter entitled “The Face of Mercy”:

“At times we are called to gaze even more attentively on mercy so that we may become a more effective sign of the Father’s action in our lives. For this reason I have proclaimed an Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy as a special time for the Church; a time when the witness of believers might grow stronger and more effective.”

Pope Francis has chosen the date of December 8, 2015 to begin the year of mercy because it is the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The entire Universal Church will enter into a special year of Mercy in 2016 and every parish will be called upon to practice mercy in concrete and prayerful ways. Let’s look forward to a very Holy Year.

Sunday Mass is the formal, official worship service of Catholicism and is the most important and sacred act of worship in the Catholic Church. Participating in Sunday Mass is the only way a Catholic can fulfill the Third Commandment to keep holy the Sabbath day. The Mass incorporates the Bible (Sacred Scripture), prayer, sacrifice, hymns, symbols, gestures, sacred food for the soul, and directions on how to live a Catholic life — all in one ceremony.

The Mission of the Greeters Ministry

To provide a warm and welcoming atmosphere at the Sunday Mass, especially for all of our first-time guests and members alike. As a parishioner’s first contact on arriving for Mass, greeters play a key role in the unfolding of the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Our goal is to make every person who comes through the church doors feels like a part of our parish family, by welcoming and supporting them in a positive, friendly, and spiritual manner. We want everyone who enters St. Ann Church to feel welcome and loved.

What We Do

Greeters are a liturgical ministry of hospitality. The Greeter serves as an extension of the Priest. A friendly smile and welcoming words greatly bless us all. We also distribute song sheets and special handouts.

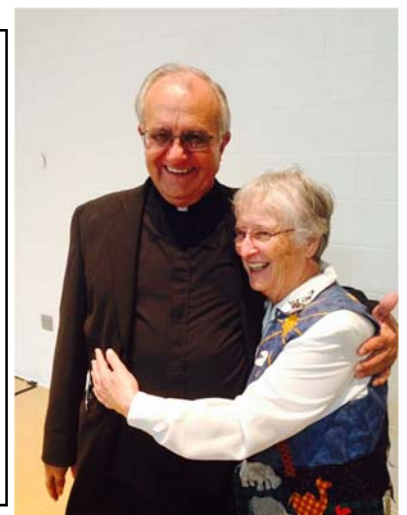

The Ministry of Consolation: Comfort for those who are grieving

Christ's call to care for those who are grieving was answered by several parishioners who joined St. Ann's Ministry of Consolation (MOC) this year. After training and commissioning, they have become an integral part of the ministry which helps with funerals, special Masses, support groups and more. Recently commissioned members include Jim Glenn, Lee Ann Meleky, Kris Ollom, Jackie Scofield, Suzie Whitehead, Tom Gehrlein, John Savarimuthu and Marcia Harbour. Brenda DeVaney has also joined the ministry.

With the busy fall season, their help is essential! Last month's Mass of Anointing was well-attended and the reception following the Mass was the largest hosted by the MOC. Two support groups began in September: the New Day grief group meets for eight weeks and the Divorce Recovery group meets for six weeks, with an optional Q and A meeting about the annulment process. These support groups will be offered again in early spring.

The ministry also helps plan and provide support for the annual bilingual Mass of Remembrance, celebrated on All Souls Day (November 2nd). And since a parish our size has a growing number of funerals, much support is needed for our priests and grieving families. The MOC helps plan funeral liturgies, assists with funeral Masses, provides condolence materials and sends correspondence to parishioners grieving the loss of a loved one. New this year, will be a 4 week *Catholic Scripture Study* on **Advent – Cycle C: Preparing for Christ**. This study will follow the *Catholic Scripture Study* format and will concentrate on the Sunday lectionary readings and incorporate the ancient method of *Lectio Divina* (praying the scriptures). This study is open for registration in October and will begin in November on Tuesday nights. This short study is good for beginners in Bible Studies as well as those who wish to understand the readings for the Lectionary Cycle C in Advent.

Each year, the community of St. Ann comes together to assist not only our own parishioners, but other agencies, churches and refugees. To make this project a success, it involves all parishioners; individuals, families as well as the ministries. It is an opportunity for us to help others have a memorable Christmas by **your** spirit of giving.

Many people help with this Service Project. The children in the Children's Religious Education programs in grades 1 – 4 decorate the ornaments to make them sparkle on the trees. The Magi committee then adds the gift information to the ornaments. Each year, the RCIA/RICA programs set the trees up in the Narthex and decorate them with the ornaments the children have made. We also have 350 volunteers to help us check in the gifts and send them on.

Who do we help? There are **children, senior citizens, and families** in need as well as **those homeless who are facing illness**. Catholic Charities has several centers that help people within the Diocese. Families at these centers apply for the program and must be approved. We also provide gifts to a Dallas Aides Hospice. In addi-

tion we include children from Family Gateway as well as those from our own parish who need assistance. Last year we were able to provide gifts to over 3,000 individuals and hope to do that again this year.



With your assistance, we will be able to once again help others **BELIEVE** someone cares for those who would otherwise not have any gifts under their Christmas tree. Christmas is about giving, and giving a gift to someone in need is a way of sharing Christ to others.

The *Magi Ministry* is a Parish wide Service Project to help those less fortunate at Christmas. This year, we will once again focus on **helping others BELIEVE in Christmas and the love of Jesus**.

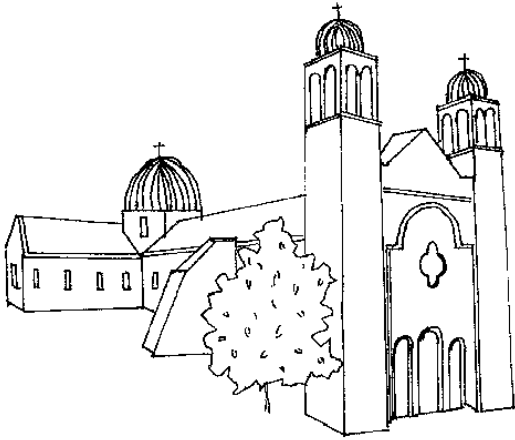
