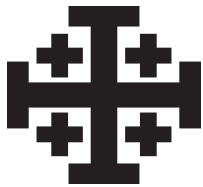

## RCIA

RCIA, Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, is the process by which both unbaptized adults (Catechumen) and those baptized in other Christian denominations become Catholic (Candidates). It is a spiritual formation process culminating with entry into the Catholic Church at Easter Vigil with the celebration of the Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism (if not previously baptized in another Christian denomination), Confirmation, and the Eucharist. RCIA continues during the Easter season until Pentecost for the Period of Mystagogy.

RCIA has been a bustling, well attended process so far this year with sessions held on Sunday mornings. Varied teachings and reflection opportunities take place each Sunday to inform and help prepare the participants on their spiritual journey. Emphasis is placed on building community and service opportunities that allow participants to be the hands and feet of Christ. Serving dinner to RICA (Spanish RCIA), cleaning at Mount Carmel Center, assembling Thanksgiving baskets, decorating Magi trees, and decorating Christmas cards at the Vista Ridge Senior Living Center were all occasions for the RCIA participants to serve and build community.

The Rite of Welcoming and Acceptance took place on December 15th at the 8 am Mass. This Rite brought the unbaptized before the parish community where they stated their desire to become baptized members of the Catholic Church. Those already baptized also expressed their desire to join in the fullness of the Catholic Church as they look to receive the sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at Easter. The parish assembly affirmed the participants who now move into the Period of Catechumenate. During this Period, participants will be given further guidance and formation aimed at preparing them to celebrate the sacraments and live the Christian life.

Each RCIA participant has a sponsor to accompany him / her on their spiritual jour-

ney. St. Ann has been blessed to have a large number of sponsors at the ready at the beginning of each RCIA year. A retreat will take place February 8 / 9 where participants will focus on deepening their relationship with Christ and learning more about our Catholic faith. Please pray for the RCIA participants during the retreat and throughout the RCIA process. You can place faces to your prayers by viewing the participants' pictures displayed in the hallway near the Children's Liturgy of the Word room.

## Montserrat — Jesuit Retreat House

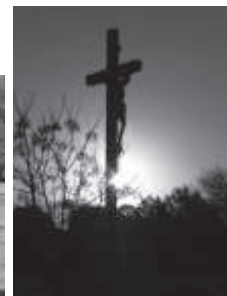
If you've noticed any of your fellow St. Ann parishioners walking around with a renewed spirit or a holy glow lately, it is possible that they may have been one of the 62 men that attended the recent **St. Ann Men's Retreat at Montserrat Retreat House on the shores of Lake Dallas**. The retreat was led by Kevin Harrington who is a spiritual director trained in the Spiritual Exercises of St Ignatius the founder of the Jesuit order. The exercises, which have been used by millions over the 500 years since Ignatius created them, encourage retreatants to focus on the gifts given to us by God and how the use of those gifts bring us closer to God. As we are all created to Know, Love and Serve God, it is through the use of our gifts that we help build God's Kingdom here on earth. As the Jesuit motto suggests, we are all called to serve *Ad Majorem Dei Gloriam* – for the greater glory of God!

The retreat structure includes a series of talks given by the retreat director for contemplation by the retreatant. The talks are spread throughout the weekend interspersed with the recitation of the rosary, stations of the cross and the Sacraments of Reconciliation,

Anointing and Daily Mass. The 3-day silent retreat is just one of the many spiritual resources available at Montserrat located off of Swisher Road and Interstate 35E. In addition to the retreats, the Jesuits offer mini retreats on the first Saturday of every month, provide training in the spiritual exercises through the Ignatian Institute and have been known to step in on occasion to say Mass or participate in reconciliation services at parishes in the Dallas and Fort Worth Dioceses as they have done many times here at St. Ann.

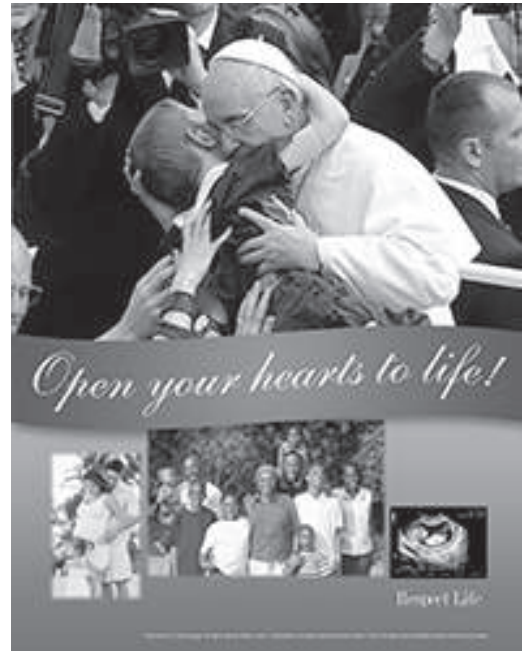
## St. Ann Respect Life Ministry

### Are you an Ostrich?

Some issues make us uncomfortable and want to play the ostrich; figuratively speaking bury our heads in the sand. Abortion is one of those issues for many people. Since the Roe vs. Wade decision of 1973, abortion without restriction has been legal in America. This has been further indoctrinated into our culture through the use of terms like “Pro-Choice” and a “woman’s right to choose” instead of what abortion really is, the killing of a baby. What can each of us do to change this situation? The tide is shifting. Polls now show that more than half of the people in the US oppose abortion, and even a greater percentage oppose late-term abortions (usually defined as after 20 weeks gestation). Thankfully, many states have enacted laws that place limits on abortion. Getting personally involved and supporting Pro-Life activities can help save more babies.

The real question is: Do we value expediency over life itself? Here are a few relevant facts to enhance your perspective on the subject:

- Since the Roe vs. Wade decision by the Supreme Court in 1973 approximately 55 million innocent babies have been denied their opportunity for life in the US alone. Life is one of the rights of all people as defined by our Constitution.
- Even though 20 weeks is being used as a limit to abortions in many States, the heart starts beating at 18 days and there is scientific evidence the baby feels pain in 8 weeks or less.
- Abortion supporters would have us believe that Roe vs. Wade is chiseled in stone. It isn’t. Legal experts, including such notable liberals as Ruth Bader Ginsberg, John Hart Ely, and Jeffrey Rosen, have criticized the decision. Norma McCorvey, (Jane Roe) has tried to have the decision reversed and is now Pro-Life. It was, and continues to be, a bad decision that should be reversed.
- The Supreme Court had little, if any, knowledge of DNA in 1973. Science has discovered that when the egg and the sperm first merge—the moment of conception—all of the DNA of a human being is present. From that moment, the egg which **had been part of the woman’s body ceases** to be part of her body and becomes a new body-- a separate, unique individual. The woman becomes the baby’s nurturer and protector. The woman is, indeed, “with child” just as the baby is “with mother.”



- Despite vigorous and even vitriolic protests, the Texas Legislature passed a new law (HB-2) banning abortions after 20 weeks, requiring abortion physicians to have admitting privileges at a local hospital, and abortion clinics to meet surgical room requirements.
  - “Greed is the root of all evil.” This holds true for the lucrative abortion industry. The abortions industry in the U.S generates huge cash flow for organizations like Planned Parenthood. For more details please watch the movie “Blood Money” to see what our tax dollars are supporting.
- So what can you do to help support life from conception to natural death? Let us help you answer that question and many more. Please consider joining or supporting the activities of the St Ann Respect Life Ministry. It is appropriate that our parish, dedicated to Mary’s mother, should have a ministry to support the protection of unborn children. These guidelines are based on knowledge of theory and research about how young children develop and learn.

Nurtures Young Spirits

In partnership with parents, Angel Creek Preschool introduces God, Jesus and the concepts of Christian Virtues. A special time each week is set aside for Chapel, when all come together to praise God.

Provides Professional Quality

Angel Creek Preschool is made up of caring trained professionals, **all working on the behalf of your child's development.** We maintain small classes of approximately 10-14 children, in an effort to give each child the care and focus they deserve. Each classroom is staffed with two teachers. Annual training is required of all staff including CPR, first aid and the protection of children. Our teachers have experience teaching students with learning differences and dual language learners. Angel Creek Preschool is licensed by The Texas Department of Family and Protective Services.

## St. Ann Men's Club—Thanksgiving Basket Annual Drive

Starting in 1994, the St. Ann's Men's Club began a tradition of organizing and distributing Thanksgiving Baskets to those in need on the Sunday before Thanksgiving Day.

What is involved with this annual event?

Each year we begin organizing the annual Thanksgiving Basket drive in September. We reach out to the communities where we delivered baskets the prior year and begin to gather the list of recipients. It is vital that recipient information is kept confidential and that the recipients are willing to accept the basket.

We also reach out to local grocery stores and schedule food drives in late October or

early November. This past year, we conducted two food drives at the Kroger store on MacArthur and the Market Street store on 121 and Denton Tap. We have coordinated our purchasing power with the Carnival to obtain better prices on turkeys, other perishable items, and other canned goods that are not typically donated. Likewise, we reach out to companies to help with our drive.

This past year, Harry Price Company & Fresh Point Produce donated 6,000 pounds of potatoes and Sysco donated the refrigerated truck. Our beautiful St. Ann community generosity with cash donations, food donations and volunteers comprises the majority

of the Thanksgiving Basket needs.

What does a Thanksgiving basket contain? A turkey, cooking pan, gallon of milk, 5 lb. bag of potatoes, stuffing, mac & cheese, pie crust, 12 rolls, pie filling, 2 cans of corn, 2 cans of green beans, yams, cranberry, mixed vegetables, gravy mix, and approximately four miscellaneous items....and lots of LOVE.

This last Thanksgiving, St. Ann community distributed 1,202 baskets on Sunday, November 24, 2013.

## Continuing Catechetical Formation

### CCF: Continuing Catechetical Formation

What is CCF? It stands for *Continuing Catechetical Formation*. This is the Diocesan program to bring courses designed to help people understand the teaching of the Catholic Church and instruction on how to share the faith using God's pedagogy. The courses were developed by the Catechetical Services Office under the guidance of Bishop Kevin Farrell around Scripture, Theology, Methodology & Skills, as well as Personal & Spiritual Maturity. These courses are taught by Diocesan approved instructors.

They were designed to assist a catechist in living out their vocation to proclaim the Gospel and share the knowledge of God's love in the life of his people. To do this, the catechist must have a foundation built on truths of our faith and an understanding of how to share Christ's message with conviction and fervor. It is this openness to growth that allows the catechist to cultivate an adult understanding of their faith, the ability to teach effectively, and the spiritual formation to form a loving relationship with God.

These courses are open to all. We invite you to share in the knowledge of our faith formation and forming your spirituality! ## Sisters In Christ

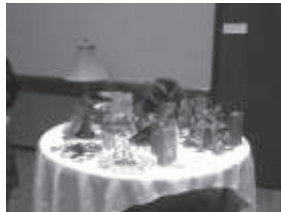

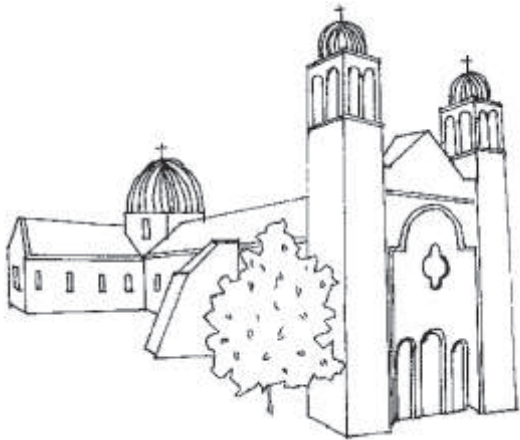
