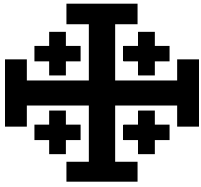

Easter is What We Always Celebrate

As you read this, we will have celebrated the great *Triduum*, the three day solemn proclamation of the suffering, death and Resurrection of Jesus. These three days are the highest and greatest celebrations of the central, core beliefs of the Christian community. We focus upon these events in a very special way during these three days. The reality, however, is that these are the same events we proclaim and celebrate in every Eucharistic liturgy. Moreover, it is the reality that permeates all of our prayers, whether individual or

communal, and whether we are aware or unaware of the fact. In a simplified understanding, our identity as believers flows from the Easter mysteries of the Father, Son, and Spirit.

We have been reborn to newness of life in the Resurrection of Jesus. St. Paul in his famous affirmation says, “I live now, not I, but Jesus lives in me!” How different it is to live in the light and hope of the resurrection. Some live in the light and hope of career success, money, or personal fulfillment. In the light of the Resurrection all

these other hopes and lights may still exist, but they are overshadowed by the brilliance of the Resurrection of Jesus and what it means for us. We can find our true selves only in the light of the Resurrection of Jesus.

The meaning of Easter is not so much what the Father did for Jesus, but what Jesus is doing for each of us through his Resurrection, for through that reality we have the hope and certainty of life that knows no end.

Our New Church—Did you know...?

- Stained glass windows were originally used to teach the bible stories to parishioners. Many years ago, people could not read, so they were taught via the picture windows!
- Our stained glass window style is based on the windows in the cathedral in Augsburg, Germany, which has the oldest stained glass windows in the world.
- In older stained glass windows, the only colors they had were primary colors. The use of strong primary colors at St. Ann was a good choice considering the bright Southern sunlight and significant height off of the ground.
- The pictures and designs of the stained glass windows were developed via an interactive process between Msgr. Broderick and the artists.

Q & A—“Why don’t we have a crucifix in the chapel?”

While praying in the chapel, you may have wondered why there continues to be a huge blank space on the wall behind the altar. No crucifix. No banners. Nothing.

Instead of hanging a single crucifix in the chapel, the intent is to compliment the chapel’s mission style with a **rererdo**—a carved or ornamented screen with religious icons placed behind the altar in a church. Typically the

rererdo is carved in wood and painted, with niches for the placement of religious statues and saints. Technically, one of these screens on the high altar is a retable, although the distinction between the two is often blurred.

Rererdos are common in mission style chapels. The mission churches in southern California often have rererdos spanning the width and length of the chapel

wall behind the main altar.

We are currently talking with religious artisans and craftsman skilled in this art, in the U.S., Europe, and Mexico, to transform our current blank chapel wall into a fitting rererdo for our own mission style chapel here at St. Ann.

Ministry Spotlight: Brothers In Christ

Two years ago, Luis Gonzalez petitioned Monsignor Broderick with the idea of starting a new ministry called Brothers In Christ. This ministry was based on a movement started in the Catholic Church during the mid 1990's entitled St. Joseph's Covenant Keepers. The basic premise underlying the Covenant Keepers was to encourage men to live in accordance with the principles established by St. Joseph, our Lord's earthly father, and the Magisterium of Holy Mother Church.

Through the grace of God, the Brothers In Christ ministry at St. Ann quickly flourished.

Today there are over 80 members and that number is growing. At its core, the members of Brothers In Christ seek to meet once every three weeks in small groups of eight to twelve men to challenge and support one another to live according to the eight promises of the St. Joseph Covenant Keepers. These commitments, among other things, govern the way in which men should love their wives, guide and educate their children, and establish Christ as Lord over their lives and families in all respects.

According to Luis, beginning this new ministry naturally fol-

lowed from the inspiration he found during his time and experience with Christ Renews His Parish. The direct benefits of this new ministry, Luis hopes, will be found in husbands and fathers who are grounded in their daily walk with Christ. As a result, these men should then be able to raise their children as the next generation of evangelizing Catholics. Funding a Dream In order to realize the parish dream of a new church, a capital campaign was established to help fund the construction costs through pledges to be paid over a three-year period from February 2000 to May 2003.

You may also be wondering why the continued emphasis on the Capital Campaign for a church that is already built. The short answer is that although the church is built, we have a balance of \$5 million to be repaid. Consequently all future development is contingent on the retirement of this loan.

No Hands but Ours The new church has benefited each of us and our families—each of us is

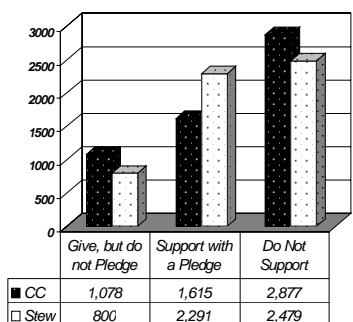
called to share in the fiscal responsibility of having built a fitting house of God to serve the people of St. Ann.

The subsequent conversion of millions has put Mary into a special place in the hearts of Hispanics everywhere. Coupled with the high regard that mothers hold among Hispanics, the devotion to Mary has blossomed. The

tradition of having her statue in a family’s home helps to unite the family in prayer, seeking the intercession of Our Blessed Mother before Christ Our Lord.

The statue helps remind families that they are called to model the Holy Family in faith, hope and love.

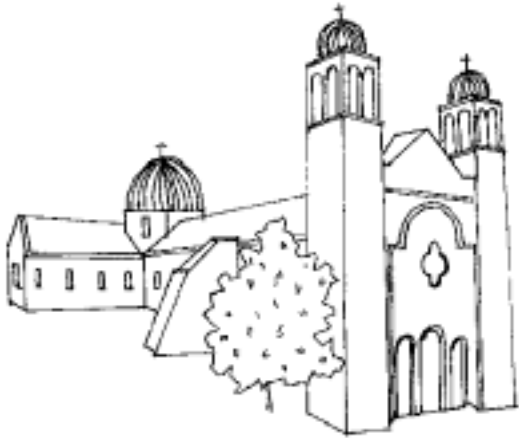
