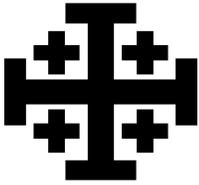

RCIA—Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults

Who can remember the days when becoming a Catholic meant several sessions with the parish priest and memorizing a list of questions from the Baltimore catechism? Well, things have changed! Following Vatican II, adults wishing to join the Catholic Church undertake a process known as the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA). Modeled on the concept that church is a community and becoming Catholic involves more than memorizing cate-

chism, RCIA emphasizes belonging to a faith community. Nowhere is this more evident than at St. Ann. Thanks to the dedication of many parish leaders over the past fourteen years, the RCIA program has evolved into its present state...a dynamic process that not only reveals the mysteries of the Catholic Church, but

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Reflections on 35 Years of Being a Priest

When you receive this newsletter, I will have already celebrated my 35th anniversary of ordination to the priesthood. Nonetheless, I wanted to share with you some reflections on that experience.

Today Catholic priests and bishops are frequently in the news, but the news reports detail their failures instead of heralding their successes and fidelity for almost 2,000 years. A very small number of priests have been involved relative to the total population of priests in the USA—there are some 46,000+ priests in this country. Is one

case too many—certainly!

I remember how the thought of becoming a priest first arose in my life. In my home parish of St. Thomas the Apostle in Chicago there was a new priest assigned to the parish, Father Thomas Mulchahy. Since all priests seemed old to me at that time, I didn't realize until long after that he was then newly ordained on his first assignment. He was a wonderful man and a great priest. I developed a relationship with him (long before such a thing was considered suspect). What struck me then, and would to this day,

was that he was as happy being a priest as anyone I ever knew doing anything. That happiness and joy was infectious. This, I think, planted the seed of becoming a priest.

Since I was ordained 35 years ago, I can say without reservation that I have never ever regretted or questioned being a priest. For me it has been the fullest, happiest and most fulfilling life that I could ever imagine. It is for this reason that I realize from time to time how undeserving I am of this gift from Jesus.

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Our New Church—Did you know...?

- The altar located in the main church is constructed of “Sunset Red” Texas granite and weighs 8,000 lbs.
- It is necessary for the valid consecration of the altar, fixed or portable, to contain relics of at least one martyr sealed into the sepulcher.
- A relic is “something belonging to, or connected with Our Lord or the Saints, such as a portion of their bodies or a

garment that they wore.”

- Our altar contains the relics of eight saints:

St. John Neumann—a Philadelphia bishop who organized the first parochial school system

St. Frances Xavier Cabrini—a patron of immigrants and the first American saint

St. Martin de Porres—a man loved by the poor and given the gift of healing

The Japanese Martyrs—there

were 26 crucified for being Christians

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton—founder of the Sisters of Charity religious order

St. Charles Lowango—an African missionary and patron of black African young people

St. Rose of Lima—patroness of the Philippines and the Americas

St. Faustina Kowalska—patroness of lost souls

Newsflash: Chewing Gum Breaks Fast!

Yes, as Catholics, we are obliged to fast one hour before receiving Communion! Chewing gum, lollipops, mints, candy, breath mints — all break your fast. Medicines and water are permitted, but even that cup of coffee breaks your fast. Vatican II reduced the fast to one hour from the former requirement — fasting from midnight the night before. We

want to approach the all-holy and most pure God in Communion with purity of heart, soul and body. Fasting helps us do this.

Not because of church requirement do we desire Communion with Our Lord, but because as Christians and Catholics we know this sacrament as the deepest mystery of our faith, and the holiest gift of God’s

mercy. We approach Our Lord in Communion with a clean and anxious heart, for He promised:

“I am the Living Bread come down from heaven. If anyone eats of this bread, he will live forever.”

If you were unaware of this teaching in the past, now is the time to make it right. Start anew today!

Like all people, some things I do well, some things ok, and some things poorly. For every success I thank the Father through Jesus, who is the source for all that is holy, all that is good. My failures I claim as totally my own, for in those actions I foolishly relied on myself and not the power of the Lord.

I think it’s more difficult for

men to choose the priesthood today for a variety of reasons. I pray, and ask that you pray as well, that more will respond to the call of Jesus to share in his Priesthood. I’ll close with a passage from St. Paul that I have sent before. I use this passage because it captures what I want to say to each of you.

“I give thanks to my God for all my memories of you, happy at all times

in all the prayers I offer for all of you...May your love grow richer and richer yet, in the fullness of its knowledge and the depth of its perception, so that you may learn to prize what is of value. May nothing cloud your conscience or hinder your progress, but may you reap the full harvest through Jesus Christ...”

Ministry Spotlight: Eucharistic Ministers / Ministry of the Sick

Serving as one of the Eucharistic Ministers at St. Ann is among the most important and sacred volunteer activities in our faith community. Led by Ed Reiss, a group of well-trained Eucharistic Ministers distributes the Holy Eucharist at Mass each week. According to Ed, to serve in this capacity one must show reverence toward the Blessed Sacrament and have first received the Sacrament of Confirmation. Although it is not a requirement, he notes that many Eucharistic Ministers also participate in the Adoration

of the Blessed Sacrament.

In addition to the fine work done by Ed Reiss and his volunteer staff, Pete Markwald leads a group of volunteers in another vital ministry—the Ministry to the Sick. Among other duties, this ministry serves the Holy Eucharist to those parishioners who are unable to attend Mass. Over the years, Pete has stated that he has found a wonderful “strength and peace” in serving the Lord in this manner as he prepares himself for the Deaconate.

The sheer number of parishioners who attend Mass each week and receive the Holy Eucharist as well as the large number of parishioners who need to be served at home creates an ongoing need for more volunteers in both ministries.

As a brief aside, when you next see Pete Markwald, please congratulate him, as he is scheduled to be ordained as a Deacon on June 29!

Under the direction of Jim Courtney, the St. Ann RCIA team is a group of volunteers who have now worked together for several years. To conduct a quality program of this scope, this core team consists of catechists, administrators, audiovisual experts, emcees, and coordinators for the social, hospitality, and childcare provider ministries. Additionally, there are those who assist the candidates and sponsors to ensure the necessary paperwork is in order and all requirements are fulfilled.

The team begins planning each summer, with the RCIA year commencing in late August consisting of weekly classes, and culminating at the Easter Vigil Mass. RCIA has been fortunate to attract various local

and national experts as guest speakers in past seasons, allowing the program to provide a comprehensive view of important issues facing Catholics today.

One of the highlights of every year's program is the overnight retreat. Held at a nearby retreat center, this retreat offers the opportunity to build on the doctrine already learned, to establish a deeper understanding of the faith, and to gather as a faith community much as the early Christians did. It is also a time for fellowship and fun. In the past we have even discovered some “Karaoke” masters!

Why is the program at St. Ann so successful? It is largely due to the success of the St. Ann community itself. As a growing, dynamic parish, we have

attracted a population of interested candidates. Beyond that, the RCIA Team is dedicated to treating each individual with respect, creating a welcoming and loving atmosphere in the church community, and presenting doctrine as it is found in the Holy Scriptures and the Catechism of the Catholic Church. Another major contributor to the program's success is the dedication of the sponsors. Each candidate is teamed with a sponsor who attends class with them, answers questions, and eases their transition into the practice of the Catholic faith.

Religious Education: SAY Walks & Talks the Good News

SAY is our burgeoning and bustling middle school ministry that serves over 500 youths. So much adolescent energy is hard to contain. The right thing to do is to channel this energy and, as Christians, to spread the Good News. SAY has taken the words of St. Francis to heart. We have “walked the talk.”

On June 27, many of our St.

Ann youths committed a week of service to Mission Possible. We worked at various service agencies that serve at-risk youths and families in Irving and Arlington. Our service consisted of yard work, cleaning, and sorting, and it was very much appreciated. This effort caps a great service year for SAY. As a group we sold hand-made crosses, raising \$471 for the Life

Teen Mexico Mission Trip; we stuffed 800 gift bags for the missionaries; we collected 200 sweat shirts and 500 pairs of socks for the Denton State School; we collected over 1,000 cubic feet of coats and 1,800 cans of food for Catholic Charities; and we donated \$100 for Afghan children. SAY is faith in action!

Development News: Survey Results & Stewardship Renewal




